For decades, this moving ceremony has been held at Whitepine Cemetery on the traditional (original) Memorial Day, which is May 30. The ceremony is open to the public and features a color guard, music, a short speech, and the reading of the 160+ names of veterans who rest at Whitepine. It concludes with the playing of "Taps" by a bugler.

In the past, the ceremony has been produced by Whitepine Church. This year the torch is being passed to **Whitepine Grange**, the new sponsor.

Please turn out for a very pleasant evening Friday, May 30, 7pm at Whitepine Cemetery. The event will be held under cover in the building at the rear of the cemetery, and will last about an hour.

Passing the torch

Whitepine Grange takes on a new roll in community

It was May 30, 2007, when my husband and I first attended the annual Memorial Day ceremony

at Whitepine Cemetery. We'd read about it in the Ledger. It coincided with the formal dedication of the Veterans' Memorial there, and was well attended by local dignitaries and Sanders County residents. The pastor who prevailed over the outdoor ceremony was Mary Harker, a small but hardy woman whose voice was WAY too deep and strong to match her petite frame. Mary was pastor at Whitepine Methodist Church, just down the road.

Mary Harker made such an impression on us that night that we vowed to attend this ceremony every year. Mary is now departed, but I can still hear her deep, resonant voice delivering a moving message to us about the importance of honoring veterans on that day—and not just those who died on active duty, but all who served and are now gone.

For many years, the church had coordinated with the Whitepine Cemetery Board to present this ceremony, always held on May 30 which Congress had originally called "Memorial Day." Lloyd and Pat Austin, church members, were also on the cemetery board and active in the planning of the Memorial Day service there. Church members volunteered with details.

The most outstanding feature of each year's service was the solemn "Roll Call" reading of names of all veterans who rested at Whitepine Cemetery. That number has grown each year, and the current roll includes more than 160 names.

This year, with Pat Austin's blessing, Whitepine Methodist Church is handing the torch to Whitepine Grange, which will add this important annual event to its community services. The Grange is happy and honored to take on this roll and insure that this event will continue each year without interruption.

If you drive past the cemetery just west of MM36 on Highway 200, you will notice the flags and white crosses posted on all the graves of military veterans at this beautiful site. These flags and crosses are part of the annual observance. They are placed there by community volunteers—this year by Whitepine 4-H members.

Take an hour away from your barbecue on Friday, May 30, and attend the Whitepine Cemetery ceremony. The men and women who rest there with flags on their graves made it possible for you to enjoy those hotdogs, beer and RV trips. May 30 is about those people. Honor their memories!





















New construction underway!

Thanks to the **Nesbitt Family Foundation** and **AgWest Farm Credit Services**, Whitepine Grange is growing an appendage! These two entities have graciously provided funds for construction of a 12'x12' storage room that will be added to the northeast corner of the Grange building.

Contractor for the project is Matt Braun. John Haakenson, Grange executive committee member, coordinated the project.

The new room will have an access door from the front of the main room. It will accommodate tables, extra chairs, trampolines, plus other exercise equipment and dog training materials. This will clear the main floor of clutter along the walls and will add considerable working space to the room.

"Friends of Whitepine Grange" is a nonprofit organization that has written the grants and coordinated fundraising for virtually all improvements made to the building over the past four years. "Friends" is deeply indebted to the Nesbitt Family Foundation and to AgWest Farm Credit Services for making these improvements possible!

Air conditioner is coming!!

Exercise classes, dog training classes and other regular events will be carried on through the summer this year, thanks to new air conditioning! Installation will be done early this summer, just in time for the hot weather that normally forces indoor activities to slow down due to heat buildup.

The air conditioning unit and installation are funded in part by a grant from **Montana Blue Cross/Blue Shield,** an organization that realizes the importance of being able to continue fitness classes and other health-related activities without a seasonal break.

The Grange offers two fitness classes called "Joy of Movement" at 9am on Mondays and Thursdays. We have also started a "Beginner Clogging" class that meets on Wednesday evenings. Dog training classes are held on Wednesday mornings. And....we are hoping to host Zumba Gold classes starting very soon! Activities like these would have been unpleasant or impossible in the "old days" (five+ years ago) before the Grange had such amenities as windows and ceiling fans to keep patrons from sweltering. Now, with real A/C, you 'Il have a COOL place to work out and no excuses not to do so!



SFT proves Montana seniors' fitness level is "above average"

Living in the "Last Best Place" provides countless blessings—one of which is a healthy lifestyle and longevity.

The National Senior Fitness Test offered at Whitepine Grange in March proved this to be true. About 60 participants, ages 60 and up, took part in the testing supervised by licensed physical therapist Jim Bittinger and a crew of trained volunteers. The test was offered free

of charge to all, thanks to a grant from the Community
Health Alliance in Missoula.

Our most senior participant was Blanche Williams, 96, who blew away the competition in the arm curl test with a 5-pound dumbbell. Bittinger coached her and lost count of how many reps she did!


